

ABOUT IAEM

The International Association of Emergency Managers (IAEM) is a non-profit, educational organization. Membership includes local, state and federal emergency managers, homeland security officials, educational, military, private, non-governmental and volunteer practitioners. Membership is open to anyone practicing or interested in the field.

The membership year is October-September. New member fees after March are credited to next year's dues. All dues are quoted in U.S. dollars.

CERTIFICATION FEES

Fees are based on costs to process candidate materials. IAEM is a non-profit organization. Note that members are charged lower application fees because the IAEM treasury subsidizes certification activities.

REGISTRATION - NO CHARGE

Candidates enroll online to receive the complete application forms and booklet, and to be added to IAEM's database to receive periodic certification program updates.

The "comprehensive" aspect of Comprehensive Emergency Management includes all four phases of disaster activity: mitigation, preparedness, response and recovery for all risks — attack, man-made, and natural — in a federal-state-local operating partnership.

OBJECTIVES / PHILOSOPHY

The International Association of Emergency Managers (IAEM) created the certification program for emergency managers to raise and maintain professional standards; it is a program to certify achievements within the profession. Any emergency management professional who meets requirements is welcome to participate.

CERTIFICATION COMMISSION STRUCTURE

The program is served by a Certification Commission made up of emergency management professionals including representatives from allied fields, educators, military and private industry personnel.

Development of the program was supported by the U.S. Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), the National Emergency Management Association (NEMA) and a host of allied organizations.

PROGRAM PROCESS

To register for certification consideration, candidates must enroll online at www.iaem.com to receive an electronic copy of the application booklet at no charge. This includes detailed instructions, all necessary forms and other helpful information to aid in successful certification completion.

Completed applications are accepted at any time, and the Certification Commission meets 2-3 times annually to evaluate submissions. Specific dates are posted online.

Candidates must also take an examination in order to receive the CEM® designation, and can do so at any time by arranging a proctor with their local high school or college or at an IAEM event. A separate brochure describes format, test content sources and how to arrange a proctor. IAEM also offers an Exam Prep Course at an additional fee for those wanting an intensive review of all content prior to taking the test.

LEVELS OF CERTIFICATION

There are two types of certification offered: the Certified Emergency Manager® (CEM®), and the Associate Emergency Manager® (AEM®).

CERTIFICATION MAINTENANCE

CEMs and AEMs maintain certification by documenting 500 points every five years. At least 100 points must be earned in each of the three groups, with the remaining 200 points attained from any category of any group:

Education & Instruction – Training taken; college classes taken; training presentations; teaching (college level); course development; audio visual program development; publications; and speaking.

Participation – Membership; conferences; awards; legislative contact; and certifications.

Service & Leadership – Service role; leadership role; mentoring role; special assignment; EMAC, mutual aid assignment, foreign humanitarian aid, uniformed services assignment, federal or military deployment; local emergency (proclaimed event); EMAP assessor team service; CEM® presentation or proctoring.

Training

Submissions must be within the last 10 years. 200 contact hours are required, 100 each in emergency management and general management. Emergency management training is considered specific to the profession, and general management includes content that can be applied beyond emergency management. Note: no more than 25% of hours can be in any single topic.

Management Essay

Candidates must demonstrate knowledge, skills and abilities through this written submission, as specified in the instructions included in the application booklet.

Three References

Including from candidate's current supervisor.

Multiple-choice Examination

Candidates must pass by 70% a 100-question examination in order to receive the CEM® designation, and can do so at any time by arranging a proctor with their local high school or college or at an IAEM event. A separate brochure describes format and test content sources. Note: the examination includes a portion of questions that are considered to be universal, core content for emergency management regardless of location. Additional content is tested depending on country in which candidate is based.

Emergency Management Experience

Three years by date of application. Comprehensive experience must include participation in a full-scale exercise or actual disaster, and must encompass all phases of emergency management (mitigation, preparedness/prevention, response and recovery). Note: a baccalaureate degree in emergency management reduces the experience requirement (depending on how current is the degree) and waives EM Training if it is earned very recently.

Education

Any 4-year baccalaureate degree OR additional experience may be substituted with two years of experience considered equivalent to 30 college credits, up to the 120 credits comprising most baccalaureates. Note: after December 31, 2009 there may be no substitute for the formal degree.

Contributions to the Profession

Submissions must be within the last 10 years and be for activities performed beyond the scope of candidate's job requirements. Six separate contributions are required in areas such as professional membership, conference attendance, service role, leadership role, special assignment, speaking, teaching, course development, publication, audio-visual and interactive products, awards or special recognition, state or province certification, or legislative contact.
